Through a partnership with Binghamton University, Windsor CSD has been able to provide students with an outstanding number of extra programs. Some of the programs include Transition Academy, Liberty Partnership, Promise Zone and the Bearcat Academy.


The partnership with SUNY Broome has provided Windsor CSD the opportunity to offer college level courses in the high school and also offer a fast-forward program to high school juniors and seniors. This partnership also aided in the creation of the deliberative classroom model in the Windsor Central School District.

Partnerships with local/regional agencies and businesses have contributed to strategic planning/visioning:

At the high school, there are **three** thriving and now student-managed businesses. All of these businesses originated as a result of a local business and agency support.



High school students have the opportunity to work at a full functioning credit-union in the high school. The students also can gain personal banking experience by using the credit union to manage their finances.







High school students are also able to work in the Dunkin Donuts provided cafe on a daily basis. Students manage everything from ordering to cash register and baking duties.

The school store is a student run clothing and merchandise business operated at the high school.

Students have the ability to design clothing and merchandise logos and also coordinate ordering and finances for the business.

Modern Marketing Mentor Program-

Modern Marketing Concepts in partnership with Windsor CSD is bringing back a mentoring program that once helped thousands of New York State students. The New York State Mentor Program established by Matilda Cuomo ran from 1987-1995 and will return in 2016. Volunteers from MMC will work one-on-one with students at Weeks and Bell Elementary to help motivate them to succeed in their futures. This partnership hopes to encourage other companies to expand the program to other school districts in the area.

Big Blue Little Blue Program-

One Friday a month 23 students from Weeks Elementary are bussed to the IBM campus during their lunch and recess time to meet with their mentors and eat lunch together. The students have the opportunity to gain exposure with working professionals outside of their direct community as well as make positive connections with these professionals. After a few initial "getting to know you" months, the students work on a different future focus project each month (My Life Timeline, Dream Boards, "Virtual" traveling on the internet). Mentor participation has been fantastic; mentors have reached out and secretly purchased Christmas gifts for some mentees. Additionally mentors come prepared with different items they want to showcase for the students each month.







Promise Zone-

Promise Zone offers a number of programs to students in the Windsor Central School District through the district's partnership with Binghamton University. This program aims to promote a safe and comfortable environment for children to succeed. In the 2015-16 school year Promise Zone offered the After School Program which provides elementary students a safe and comfortable environment to complete homework and learn more about healthy lifestyle topics. Promise Zone also coordinates lunch groups for 4th and 5th grade students that work to improve literacy and encourage reading through comic books. Another lunch program offered is the Art Therapy groups that utilizes a variety of art therapy techniques to help students who are going through tough transitions in their lives. Individual support is also offered to students through Promise Zone. Master of Social Work interns meet with students on a regular basis to provide social and emotional support.

Implementation of 21st century learning for college, career, and citizenship is clearly articulated in strategic planning:

Deliberative Classroom-

This model focuses on the concept that students' voices matter. This is accomplished through inquiry based learning, evaluative questioning and holding full deliberations within classes. In deliberations, the speaking and listening standards are alive, giving students tools to make well-reasoned decisions for the future. This work, which started in one classroom as an action research project, has been found to support those at-risk. As a result, it is strategically spreading throughout the district.

College and career standards form the foundation of student learning:

Collaboration with other schools and experts in the field-

The Windsor Central School District partners with the Maine Endwell School District. Maine Endwell is a highly regarded suburban school district that resides within the same county as Windsor. This partnership gives teachers the opportunity to analyze data with an even broader community and plan for exceptional instruction. Each school is also given financial support through this partnership which provides the opportunity to expand the programs and increase professional development.

New Visions Program-

New Visions is a one-year program for high school seniors. It provides an in-depth overview of a chosen professional field by placing the student into an actual work environment. Career academies currently exist in the areas of health, engineering, business, law and government. New Visions integrates English, government and economics into a meaningful curriculum based on the career interest. The classroom is located in the job area of the chosen course of study.

Student selection is based on a rigorous application and interview process. The students must be academically strong and must have completed three years of regents math, science, English and social studies.

Youth Apprenticeship Program-

The Youth Apprenticeship Program is designed to offer high school juniors and seniors the opportunity to explore the direct connection between school learning and employment while working in their occupational field of interest. Students apply and interview for positions at local companies.

Youth apprentices leave school for part of the day (if their schedule allows) and work 10-20 hours per week, rotating through a series of placements at the work site. In each rotation, apprentices work under the direction of a coach or mentor. Summer employment is at the discretion of the employer.

Instructional systems support acquisition of content knowledge and P-21 skills:

In 2015, the district made an even greater commitment to data analysis and teacher support when a Director of Data, Assessment and Student Accountability was hired. Additionally, the district made a strategic decision to reassign a talented teacher leader to provide focused, on-the-spot support to teachers as a Teacher Mentor Coordinator. With the addition of these two positions came even more opportunities to encourage research-based practices to support and enhance P-21 skills through coaching and feedback.

Through the partnership with Maine Endwell, the schools are able to share two technology integration specialists. These specialists can be found working hands-on in the classrooms everyday. They support our educators by enhancing technology use.







Assessment systems support acquisition of knowledge and P-21 Skills:

Bi-weekly administrative data meetings-

Since the addition of the Director of Data, Assessment and Student Accountability and the Teacher Mentor Coordinator, administrative data meetings have begun on a bi-weekly basis. Through these meetings, a district-wide data analysis formal cycle has been defined. Additionally, a formal observation-feedback cycle has been established within the district to ensure that all teachers receive timely, relevant feedback framed on research based "highest leverage" areas of instruction.

Learning environments support knowledge and P-21 skills acquisition:

Students can take online college courses free of charge-

Through Edgenuity students in the Windsor Central High School have the opportunity to take free online college courses.

PSAT and SAT exams are offered to all Windsor students free of charge-

Through the Kohn Academy, Windsor students are provided free access to take the SAT and PSAT exams. The exams are offered at the Windsor High School giving less fortunate students the opportunity to take the exams without finding transportation.

Professional Development is used to build capacity to achieve 21st century outcomes-


Project-based learning approaches are utilized regularly:


Middle School health courses focus on project-based learning approach-

Windsor CSD values the importance of engaged learners and has implemented and embedded practices throught the district to ensure engagement is consistently high. In the middle school, students have the opportunity to participate in project-based learning in their health courses.

Currently, 8th grade students are tackling a huge issue "How do we solve the heroin problem in Broome County?".The students were broken up into groups and created presentations on how they believe is the best way to stop the heroin epidemic.









Inquiry-based instruction is utilized regularly:

Social Studies classrooms in grades 6-12 move to completely inquiry-based approach-

Windsor CSD is currently shifting Social Studies grades 6-12 to a completely inquiry-based approach as part of the Deliberative Classroom. The Deliberative Classroom focuses on instilling in students that their voice matter through inquiry-based learning, evaluative questioning and holding full deliberations within classes. Classrooms are focused on the learner, and the teacher facilitates the discovery of learning. In these classrooms, questions are met with a, "Let's explore that more!" attitude and the teacher is not seen as the disseminator of everything important. Students lead, engagement is high and data is demonstrating this practice's effectiveness on student performance. Thus, Windsor CSD is strategically taking steps to ensure this model spreads throughout the district.





On the following pages you will find information about the Deliberative Classroom model and how it is used in Social Studies in the Windsor Central School District.

Students have access to work-based learning:

The Windsor Central High School has three student-run businesses in the building-

The Blue Stone Cafe, Visions Federal Credit Union and the School Store are three studentrun businesses in the high school. Students have the opportunity to participate in these businesses and gain vast experiences that will help them in the future.









Learning incorporates use of information, media and technology to support individualized learning:

ChromeBooks and Ipads are present in each classroom at the elementary schools-

All classrooms in grades K-2 have five Ipad stations where students can be found actively engaged daily. In grades 3-5, each classroom has five Chromebook stations. The differentiation in technology by grade level gives students the opportunity to learn different operating systems and become familiar with up-to-date technology.





High school classes use Schoology for online instruction-

Schoology gives teachers the opportunity to upload notes, homework and review information on the course website. Students can then download any of the available information to their personal lpad or computer. Students can also submit homework assignments and answer test questions through Schoology. The use of Schoology at the high school level gives students a taste of college instruction.

Social media is used for instruction in high school classrooms-

Many teachers in the Windsor Central High School use social media as an instruction tool for their courses. Teachers use Twitter, Snapchat and Facebook to increase student engagement and improve instruction. The school district also uses social media to spread awareness of district events and recognize students and staff members for their achievements.









Smartboards are used in every classroom-


In the Windsor Central School District, each classroom has a Smartboard that is used for daily instruction.



All students have support to matriculate to college and develop career and life skills:

Windsor CSD is grounded in the moto "Whatever It Takes" - referring to the belief that all measures will be taken by all members of the educational community to ensure that students succeed and graduate as prepared citizens ready to take on the world. Windsor is especially proud of its ever-increasing graduation rate (currently 91%, up from mid-seventies percentages just a few years ago). This successful rate encompasses students of all kinds-including students with disabilities, students in poverty and students from varying ethnic backgrounds. Another way Windsor prepares students for college and career is by offering admittance into the school's robust summer program to all students.

Summer Program open to all students-

In the summer of 2015, the Windsor Central School District began offering a summer program to all students in the district. Elementary and middle school students were able to attend multiple different sessions free of charge and high school students had the option to apply to be a mentor for the program and get paid an hourly wage.

The summer program provided students with free breakfast, lunch and transportation. Elementary and middle school students were given the option to sign up for a number of different programs including Black Knights on the Move, Summer Band Camp and Knight Lights.

In the summer of 2016, the program has expanded even further to offering sport camps along with an art camp. The district hopes the number of students will also increase this summer.







Middle School hosts Up With Life Day each year-

Up With Life Day is an event that middle school students look forward to each year. The event promotes healthy and positive life choices. Each year the middle school brings in a different keynote speaker to talk to the students about life, kindness and their experiences. The students also have the opportunity to attend a number of workshops including outdoor skills, song writing, body image, personal fitness, healthy skin, yoga, financial planning, college athletics and much more. The middle school staff aims to highlight positive and healthy opportunities and choices that the students can incorporate into their lives on a regular basis to be happy and healthy individuals. In the 2015–16 school year, the middle school welcomed nationally renowned speaker Houston Kraft. Kraft spoke to the students about kindness and the fear of fitting in.









Specialized training in cross cultural and global awareness is offered for students and staff to promote success for all students:

Eric Jensen speaks to staff before the start of the 2015 school year-

In the fall of 2015 the staff in the Windsor Central School District began the school year by listening to famous educator and speaker Eric Jensen. Jensen was brought in to aid staff in learning the best teaching practices with students in poverty. He modeled brain-based teaching strategies for all of the teachers in Windsor CSD.

Manny Scott to speak in fall of 2016-

To keep with the theme of cross-cultural awareness, the students and staff will kick off the 2016 school with a training day led by Manny Scott. Manny Scott is best noted from for being portrayed as Marcus in the hit-movie, Freedom Writers. Manny will share his story of resilience, despite dealing with abuse, loss and violence.



Windsor Middle School designated 'Mix It Up' model school-

The Windsor Middle School was named a 'Mix It Up' model school by Souther Poverty Law Center for the fourth year in a row. The middle school was named for its exemplary efforts to foster respect and understanding among its students and throughout its campus during the 2015-16 school year. The Windsor Middle School Student Council organized the event. The entire student body participated in the event during lunch on the school's anti-bullying day. The anti-bullying day also included informative assemblies, class meetings about preventing bullying and a school-wide pep rally. To be named a Mix It Up Model School, the middle school had to meet five criteria: they hosted a Mix It Up at Lunch day, the included different members of the school's community-cafeteria staff, aides, administrator, teachers and students- in organizing the event they followed up with at least two additional Mix It Up-related programs or events on campus; they publicized Mix It Up at Lunch Day or celebrated inclusiveness with posters, announcements and other media; and their event was seen by students and school officials as a success.








Multiple measures suggest student learning and growth over time:

Windsor CSD has moved to the top of the region in performance-

Under the leadership of Dr. Jason A. Andrews, the Windsor Central School District has moved from the bottom of the region in test scores and performance to reaching and maintaining the district goal of ranking in the top four districts of the region on an annual basis. The charts below are test results from students in grades 3-8. Scores are rated on a 1-4 scale. 1 being the lowest and 4 the highest.







There is evidence of student mastery of citizenship skills:

Elementary students participate in elementary achievement groups-

In the elementary schools, students are put in public achievement groups that identify community problems and then formulate plans and act on solutions to solve them. At Bell Elementary fifth grade students created an innovation design to help save the earth this year. Teams of students investigated the process by which different materials are recycled into new items. Their findings inspired them to use recycled materials in the design of their innovation. Students demonstrated teamwork, cooperation, and made compromises throughout the project in order to create a product using only their best ideas in hopes of helping our planet. Teams designed innovations to help solve the global issues related to air and water pollution, oil spills, electricity overuse and recycling.







Middle school students are required to participate in community service projects where they give back-

Middle school students in the Windsor Central School District are required to develop a community service project within their advisory groups. One sixth grade group spent time reading to kindergarteners and acting as role models.







High school students have citizenship requirements to graduate-



In the spring of 2016 the Windsor Central School District participated in our first Thought Exchange process. Thought Exchange gave parents, staff and community members the chance to provide feedback about the school district and its programs. Stakeholders were able to share their thoughts by answering four open-ended questions and then later rating other anonymous thoughts. The administration plans on using this information to improve the school district overall and satisfy the stakeholders' concern.



The school district actively supports the town youth and recreation programs-

Windsor CSD along with the administrators actively support the Town of Windsor Youth Sports and Recreation Programs. The WYSR is run by Windsor parent, Rhea Deyo. Mrs. Deyo is consistently in contact with administrators and support staff to promote the plans and increase support. Business community contributes to sustainable success:


Lockheed Martin program-

As mentioned earlier, Windsor CSD partners with Lockheed Martin for the Big Blue, Little Blue Program. The program matches students in the C.R. Weeks elementary school with mentors at Lockheed Martin.

BOCES provides food programs for entire district-

Through BOCES, Windsor CSD has the ability to offer a Summer Feed Program. The program is housed at one of the elementary schools in the district each summer. Breakfast and lunch are both served five days a week for any children 18 and under free of charge.

The partnership with BOCES has also presented the opportunity for Windsor CSD to plan to provide breakfast in every classroom at the elementary level for the 2016-2017 school year. All students in elementary school will begin their day with breakfast in their classroom. Middle school students will also have easier and more cost effective breakfast options in their building every day during the school year.

For the last eight years the Lourdes Mobile Dental Van has visited Palmer Elementary twice during the school year. The Mobile Dental program provides free cleanings for students and families in need. Services are provided to students enrolled in Palmer Elementary during lunch hours and to their siblings after school. Parents have the option of signing their child up for this free program.

High school students work to fight heroin epidemic in local community-

Through the support of the administration, Broome County Sheriffs Department and Senator Fred Akshar a group of Windsor High School students are working to fight the heroin epidemic in the local community. These four high school juniors have designed a strategic plan including social media awareness and a PSA video and postcard. The students have met with the Sheriff's Department and Senator Akshar to develop this plan. The plan is currently in its early stages of distributing informative post-cards and developing social media awareness.
